From the Pastor



Pastor Paul is on sabbatical. For his monthly article he decided to dig back in the archives and share a previously published piece. The following is from April 2013.

He is not here; for he has been raised . . .

- Matthew 28:6a

This may be the only time in the Bible (at least that I can think of) where God's absence is a good thing. The above verse from Matthew's gospel recounts the dialogue between the women who have come to Jesus' grave and the angel who sits on the stone that has been rolled away. The angel tells the women that he has been raised, thus Jesus is absent from the grave.

We live in a world where many talk about the seeming absence of God. Maybe you have wondered yourself, "Where is God?" This is a reasonable question as we hear news of terrible tragedies and encounter difficulties in our own lives. The question stems from the belief that if God was present, then these terrible things would not have occurred.

The Easter story gives us an altogether different understanding of God's presence. In the story of Jesus' passion we see that God does not avoid suffering and pain but rather walks right into it and bears that pain for the liberation of creation and for our liberation. In Jesus' final days we see that it is in the midst of pain and chaos where God is found, for Jesus willingly and obediently enters into that sorrow. Where do we find Jesus on Good Friday? In the most God-forsaken place history has ever known, hanging from a cross on Golgotha.

This is not something that Jesus' followers expected. When he tells his disciples that he is going to suffer and die they could not understand and they were afraid to ask what it all meant (Mark 9:32). The same is true for us today. We often fall prey to the common and erroneous belief that difficulties in life are a sign of God's displeasure and absence from our lives. We forget that God knows what it is like to feel pain and absence and that the trials we face in life do not necessarily mean God is absent. Indeed, in our darkest times we can be confident that God goes with us and can deliver us. This is one of the glorious truths that Easter proclaims.

Jesus takes the sin of the world – becomes sin for our sake (2 Cor. 5:21) – and dies. But that is, of course, not the end of the story. Easter proclaims that he has risen, there is no grave, no darkness or evil that can contain him. He is the One we follow. He is the One who forgives us our sins and, then, calls us 'sisters' and 'brothers.' He is the One who goes *with* us through our trials and can deliver us to goodness and life, for he has conquered the greatest foe, which is death.

This profound truth is captured in of the simplest liturgies within the Church: *He is risen; He is risen, indeed!* As we go through this Eastertide season may we cling to this truth, placing our hope in the One who knew forsakenness and absence on our behalf and who rose from the grave to lead us into God's presence this day and in the days to come. May we be a people who joyfully proclaim, He is risen!

Council Chair Dedie Moore called the meeting to order at 5:52 pm and opened in prayer.

ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA: Pastor Penny's funeral; donation to Hanna Searls.

M/M/S by Peg Osmundson/David Moore to approve the minutes of the March 14, 2023 meeting. Motion carried.

TREASURERS'S REPORT: M/M/S by Terry Eggum/Agnes Gilson to approve the Treasurer's report from March, 2023 for audit. Motion carried.

<u>DIACONATE REPORT</u>: Peg Osmundson reported Communion will be May 7 by Intinction. There will be a Split Rock service and picnic on June 18. The One Great Hour of Sharing offering will be June 25 and will go to earthquake relief in Turkey and Syria through the American Baptists. This will be announced in the bulletin and newsletter.

TRUSTEE REPORT: Mike Osmundson reported that there will be a workday on May 20 and there will be a sign-up sheet. The new website is up and running (unitedprotestant.org) and is set up so people can donate with credit cards through PayPal. Philip Christman continues to work on a general policy for the church keys disbursement. The locks will be changed and new keys distributed. The Trustees will be in charge of distributing the new keys. Highway clean-up is May 13-28 and we are also scheduled for October. The discussion on whether we will continue to do this project in 2024 was tabled until the June meeting. M/M/S by Terry Eggum/Ruth Eggum that we purchase an extra microphone for \$500. Motion carried.

<u>CHRISTIAN ED REPORT</u>: Dedie Moore reported that we will begin a new Bible study on the New Testament on April 19.

<u>OLD BUSINESS</u>: There was no report on the Tabitha Ministry. David and Dedie Moore reported on the progress being made in sponsorship of a Ukrainian refugee family through Alight, an organization based in the Twin Cities. They are interested in knowing if there are people interested in helping and whether the church will help in welcoming them to the United States. Dedie also said she will contact other churches in the area to see if they are interested.

<u>NEW BUSINESS:</u> The Council decided to remove the Covid Protocols from the Sunday bulletin. We will continue to keep the offering plate at the rear of the church, rather than passing the plates through the pews. Peg Osmundson will call Split Rock Park to see if we can get discount park passes for the June 18 service. The shelter has already been reserved for UPC. Ruth Eggum will call Helen Stronach and try to find out details of the funeral for former Pastor Penny Fritze-Teitz. The church will decide whether to send flowers or a memorial gift when we know the details. M/M/S by Shirley Whiteford/Ruth Eggum to send Hanna Searls \$50 to be used towards the ballet camp she will be attending this summer. Motion carried.

The next Council meeting will be May 9, 2023 at 6:00 pm.

M/M/S by Peg Osmundson/David Moore to adjourn the meeting at 6:38 pm. Motion carried. Chair Dedie Moore closed in prayer.

I personally struggle this time of year as we find ourselves "stuck" indoors often while it's really hot. I really have to be intentional about looking for, and identifying, the things that are good. I find that there are always things that are good and to be thankful for, even in the midst of a season of "yuck".

Graduation Time 2023

This month it was easier to find things to celebrate because it's graduation time! The Thai school year begins in mid-May and ends in mid-March (I'm still not used to that yet!). On March 17th we enjoyed celebrating the 11 graduates of House of Blessing daycare. These students worked hard learning the Thai and English alphabet, basic math skills, classroom behavior, personal hygiene, and loved learning about Jesus through Bible stories and songs. Our House of Blessing teachers are amazing! These graduates have all been accepted to continue their education in the Thai public school system at the first grade level and we know they are well-prepared for their next step in education. Please pray for these graduates and their future endeavors, and that most importantly they will always remember that they are loved by God. We will miss having them at the daycare this next school year but we look forward to welcoming 15 new level-one students bringing our enrollment to around 45 students for the 2023-2024 school year

They remind us that all feel angry, alone, but that we are never alone. We are so fortunate to have our church family as well as God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit. We have so much to be grateful for.

Ukrainian Refugees

You shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt. Leviticus19:34

David and I are investigating the possibility of sponsoring Ukrainian refugees. We have started the process by filling out a profile on WelcomeUS, the government site which coordinates this process. Alight, formerly the American Refugee Committee, is also assisting us in the process. After filling out the profile, then potential beneficiaries can contact us if it seems like a good fit, and we would set up conversations with them to see if it might work for both of us. There are definite limitations here: small area, housing shortage, jobs, and no Ukrainian community. So far no one has responded. We are also considering other ways to help. If we find a good fit with a beneficiary, then we fill out the government forms to apply for sponsorship. If we do find a beneficiary that seems a good fit, then the church will set up a separate account that people could donate into and be tax deductible. Mostly we are looking for a welcoming community. David Moore

David Moore spent his first five years living in Tennessee and later until the age of 23 years in the Chicago area. His dad, Jerry, and his mom, Reba, provided a structured clean and orderly home with a strong religious and work ethic. Reba was a stay-at-home mom who made his and his sister Emily's clothing, curtains for the home and was the family carpenter. Dave's dad worked long hours for the Redi Mix Company that provided all the concrete for the tallest U.S.A. skyscraper at the time of its completion in 1974 (Sears Tower in Chicago).

Dave enjoyed attending five different school by the 5th grade. At that point his parents had saved enough money for a down payment on a house. His childhood years were filled with sports, music and the Boy Scouts. Later, Dave attended the University of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana from 1969 to 1971. He then attended College of Du Page. Some of Dave's fond memories recall skating on the local pond especially in the moonlight. There were no streetlights or businesses where they lived. At that time it was still country with farms around. Dave remembers ice skating on the road to church one Sunday night. He also recalls getting the family car stuck in the mud on Prom night. Dave says, "Paul Harvey has the rest of the story." Thinking of his dad, Dave remembers his father, being exhausted, would fall asleep on the couch after supper. His sister, Emily, and Dave would wake him up to go to bed.

Once David realized a suit and tie kind of job was not for him, he studied at College of Du Page to learn the HVAC trade. He could use his mind and body in that field. Later he migrated into electronics and spent 16 years working on/managing medical equipment. After working in those fields, David and his wife, Dedie Moore, moved to Silver Bay where David worked as General Manager of Wilderness Family Food manufacturing. Through his work experiences, Dave says one important skill is "how to be wrong, gracefully." He has found that it is more important to learn how to manage folks in the workplace than learning technologies. Dave found it to be gratifying to enable people to have ownership of their jobs and allow them to grow and make mistakes along the way. As manager, underpinning the staff helps them to become all they can be.

When Dave was asked what he does in his free time, his response was, "What free time? Whoever said retirement was easy, well, they hadn't been retired yet." His days are filled with people care, music practice, maintaining three properties and watches an occasional movie on Youtube. Dedie and Dave do go out to eat frequently and sometimes lose pool games to Ruth and Terry Eggum. Dave likes small town life. He says whether going to Zups, Julies, the bank, the auto parts store, the library, town hall, police station etc. there always are friends and neighbors- this is true of the U P Church family as well. When asked what wisdom he can share for those of us who are struggling with some issues. Dave wrote, "All misery is temporary, but in that moment, who cares? The sun will rise again."


It is time for her to further challenge herself. She has been accepted in an intensive summer professional workshop in Jackson, MS.
