September 10, 2024 6:00 pm

Council Chair Terry Eggum called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Pastor Paul opened in prayer.

<u>ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA:</u> Letter from Lake County Sex Trafficking Task Force; Boards and Council meetings time change.

Greg and Nancy Christenson and Hansa? gave the Council an update on what is happening with the North Shore Mental Health Group. This included their Statement of Purpose, and a description and update on the developing Clubhouse for the Silver Bay area which will be meeting at the church. According to Mike O. this will need to include a lease agreement with the group.

M/M/S by Philip Christman/Terry Eggum to approve the minutes of the August 13, 2024 meeting. Motion carried.

<u>TREASURERS'S REPORT</u>: M/M/S by Ruth Eggum/Ed Maki to approve the Treasurer's reports for July, 2024 and August, 2024 for audit. Motion carried.

<u>DIACONATE REPORT</u>: Ruth Eggum reported that Paul Taintor will be pulpit supply for the first 3 Sundays after Pastor Paul leaves. The Gideons will be here October 27, but Terry Eggum will be gone, so someone will have to count the offering collected for the Gideons.

TRUSTEE REPORT: Mike Osmundson reported that he will be moving some church file cabinets out of his house to the church. The Duluth Brass Company is shutting down business October 1. Mike O. will speak to them about obtaining the patterns we need for our memorial board and ask them about another foundry that can do the work for us. JAWS was able to repair Lynn's office computer when it quit working. Steve Van House will do our concrete work this fall. The new lectern microphone has been ordered. The Credit Union is requiring a new signatory list, including Angie Goutermont, but everyone will need to re-sign. Mike O. will let us know when people need to go to the Credit Union.

CHRISTIAN ED REPORT: No report.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Allison Oja may be moving to rehab this week. Jean Williams and the Burges are recovering from Covid. Archer Goutermont broke his arm at this week's football game and Ryder Ernest is at Children's Hospital in the Cities from injuries sustained at the same game. Our second Community Lunch is this Friday, September 13. The August 11 offering for Post from House of Love, with an additional \$500. from the HoL fund, will cover Post's nursing tuition for this year. An additional \$5000 has been sent to the House of Love for current projects. The money left in the House of Love account can be used to support Fai, our grade school student, and also provide a start for Post's next year's tuition. Pastor will close his church e-mail account on 9/30. Lynn Anderson will have his new e-mail address for Des Moines. Pastor reported that the plan is to relocate to Des Moines on October 15.

<u>OLD BUSINESS</u>: Dedie Moore reported that CLP has enough Tabitha Ministry supplies right now. She will check with the Silver Bay library to see what they need. Chair Terry Eggum reported that he has sent letters to the five denominations requesting suggestions for pulpit supply and also names for an Intentional Interim Pastor. After all five denominations have responded, Terry will set up a Zoom meeting for the Board of Advisors. Terry also passed out copies of UPC Constitution excerpts regarding finding a new pastor.

<u>NEW BUSINESS:</u> M/M/S by Ruth Eggum/Peg Osmundson to send \$100 to the Lake County Sex Trafficking Task Force. Motion carried. Ruth Eggum will talk to Becky Goutemont about making a cake for the farewell potluck for Scaringi's on September 22. There was a discussion on making a time change for the Boards and Council meetings to earlier times during the day, rather than 5 and 6 pm. This matter was tabled until the October meeting. There was also discussion about a budget and ideas for a farewell gift for the Scaringi's.

The next Council meeting will be October 8, 2024 at 6:00 p.m.

M/M/S by Ruth Eggum/Peg Osmundson to adjourn the meeting at 7:15 pm. Motion carried. Chair Terry Eggum closed in prayer.

Currently, we are waiting for affiliated denominations to submit their representatives to UPC for the purpose of convening a Board of Advisors. We have also asked them to provide potential pulpit supply lists to help us in the coming months.

Hopefully, the Board of Advisors will assist the Church Council in selecting the denomination for our next pastor as well naming the "Intentional Interim Pastor" going forward. The intentional interim pastor could be with us for up to a year, performing normal pastoral duties, but also providing guidance in our full-time pastor selection process. Church members may remember Rev. Anne Swallow Gillis who served us as intentional interim pastor prior to Paul Scaringi's selection.

The Board of Advisors will also be involved in establishing a Pastoral Search Committee, who will be elected by our congregation. All church members interested in serving on this committee are encouraged to make themselves known.

Parish Nurse Notes

Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know. Ezekiel 37:3

October 12-20 is Bone and Joint Health Action Week. I am sure this quote from Ezekiel is pretty familiar. All things are possible with God, and the bones did need sinews, flesh and skin to live. Our bodies are meant to move, and especially weight bearing exercise is needed for bones.

The recent AARP magazine had a good article about "Stand Up Against the Sitting Disease".

Sitting for much of a day diminishes your brain, impacts your longevity, and damages your fitness and mobility. I was encouraged that even a few minutes several times a day can add up to the 30 minutes of activity that is recommended. I know many people log their steps. A team at the University of Texas found that 8000 steps a day helped fat metabolism. Even adding 1000 steps to a sedentary lifestyle can lower your risk of having heart disease by 15 percent.

Six sneaky ways to move included: Taking an exercise snack, just a short break during a commercial or for any break. Get up and move around. Move your body when you are sitting, stretch, move your legs and arms. Develop a habit of moving around before starting a new sedentary activity. Go walking with friends instead of sitting somewhere. Walk a little further when you can, park a little further away. Walk to talk with someone instead of texting, if possible.

And yet, when someone suggests we take a picture with "tiny hearts" (thumb and forefinger held together like a tiny heart) people smile, it is the same with peace signs. Why is that? For one, it is fun, but when we take a picture of the kids or staff, they want to convey that they are serious, that they are taking things seriously, that they are thoughtful. However, with the tiny hearts the focus is not on the subject, the focus is the viewer of the picture and the message being conveyed to the viewer is that "we love you." That is what I hope you recieve from the update about the summer, that it is not just an update about what God is doing in Thailand, it is that you are loved and appreciated by everyone here.

One of the kids activities this summer was to go to a local river where they can use an inner tube and play in the water to escape the heat.

How are things at the House of Love?

Things have been busy at the House of Love over the past few months. The house mother's have been doing such a great job of caring for the kids who are living at the House of Love. They have Bible study twice a week, enjoy games and activities in the evenings after homework is finished, and the kids are actively involved in participating in church functions on weekends. The house mother's have also enjoyed taking them on day trips to places like local festivals, waterfalls, hiking, special restaurants, and they also plan life-skills training activities like cooking, buying things at the market, yardwork, hygiene, taking care of their clothes, and even earning and saving their money. One of the boys worked hard to earn extra money and saved up to buy his own bicycle!


